The foundation's mission

is to advance dignity, peace and prosperity by addressing the fundamental human needs of food, water and peace. Through a variety of programs and initiatives, TPRF is dedicated to building a world at peace, one person at a time.



TPRF's global outreach in 80 countries is fueled by the enthusiasm of thousands of volunteers who donate their time and expertise. In the past 10 years, it is estimated that volunteers have provided the foundation with over \$6.4 million in pro bono work.

TPRF is a U.S.-based tax-exempt nonprofit based in California that receives top ranking from Charity Navigator and Guidestar for transparency, financial accountability and leadership.

the peace education program



The foundation's **Peace Education Program** provides courses that help people discover their own inner strength and personal peace. In 2022, 73,974 people attended Peace Education Program courses, with over 80% being in schools or correctional institutions. Two significant studies were released in 2022 finding remarkable value for participants across both of these sectors:

- 99.7% of 5,276 incarcerated participants in Brazil experienced benefits such as reduced anxiety, improved self-understanding and enhanced appreciation for life.
- Teachers in the U.S., U.K. and New Zealand found that the program "complemented other learning activities, improved academic performance, student attitudes and self-awareness."

"Our participants are not coming to us as peaceful folks. They are in conflict and have been through a lot. For us to help them find the peace inside of them is a great anchor for the future. It puts everything else in perspective."

Following is a sample
of what some of them
expressed to Prem Rawat:

"I thank you, Mr. Prem Rawat, for your lessons. I learned that every human heartbeat is a universe of possibility to freedom, that choice is within me, and that peace is within me. So that I know, now, I've got the possibility to say 'no' to the darkness. I have learned that in life, one needs to be content and that contentment comes from the heart."

"The Peace Education Program helped me to navigate feelings of revenge and anger I had within me. I learned that peace is within me. I also learned that I have the power to choose what's right for my life, the right path to move, to win with. And I learned to be someone who appreciates whatever situation that I come across, so that I know how to move on with my life."



the food for people program

First begun in 2006 in India, TPRF's **Food for People** (FFP) program provides daily hot nutritious meals and educational opportunities to disadvantaged children and handicapped elderly people in three impoverished areas. With facilities in India, Nepal and Ghana, the results have included improved health, increased school attendance, and economic growth.

Altogether, the FFP program provided a total of 736,864 meals in 2022, an increase of over 104,731 more than the number in 2021 when the pandemic frequently prompted government shutdowns

Children who would otherwise be more familiar with debilitating hunger than the spontaneous energy and joys of childhood are happily going to school learning skills that will keep hunger at bay for their families.

the food for people program



FFP Highlights in 2022

FFP India

served 121,468 meals

Beyond food and water, computer, sewing and confidence building classes were offered at the FFP India facility to people of all ages eager to learn.

FFP Nepal

served 344,030 meals

Daily meals were served at nine schools in the rugged mountains of Dhading so that children could benefit who lived far away from the facility.

FFP Ghana

271,366 meals

A new solar panel-powered air conditioning system was installed at the FFP facility in Ghana to provide relief from the intense heat and service during frequent power outages.

humanitarian aid



*In 2022, TPRF gave 14 grants
totaling \$605,262 to help
people in need.*

These included \$400,00 to provide aid and shelter to Ukrainian refugees; over \$48,000 to provide aid for victims of torrential flooding in Durban, South Africa; \$100,000 to provide aid for the devastating floods in Pakistan which covered one third of the country, as well as aid for homeless people in Brazil, support for urban gardens in Ecuador, and people suffering from severe hunger in Sri Lanka.



In 2022, TPRF sponsored two live forums for Prem Rawat to speak about the importance of peace education and personal peace.

Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia

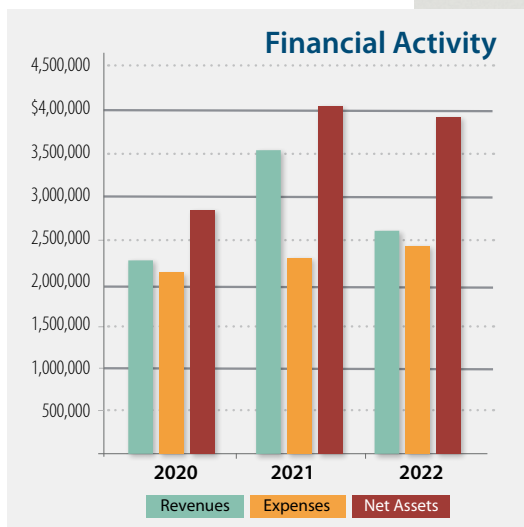
In October, Prem Rawat spoke to members of the Scouts Association of Malaysia signing a Memorandum of Understanding with them on behalf of TPRF to make the Peace Education Program available to boy and girl scouts throughout the country.

Harare, Zimbabwe:

In May, Prem Rawat visited Zimbabwe for the first time, speaking at the Harare Central Prison in Zimbabwe to staff and incarcerated people who had participated in the Peace Education Program. This insight was one of many that Prem Rawat shared with them that day:

"You have the power to change. You have the power to see what is good. But it has to be all about you. And that is the reason why the Peace Education Program works, because it places you at the center. That kindness you need to start with, has to be today, not tomorrow. You know what the difference is between today and tomorrow? Very simple. Today comes. Tomorrow never does. When it comes, it becomes today. So, don't be fooled by the word 'tomorrow.'"
